Dear Congresswoman Capps:

The undersigned organizations representing the water utility and environmental communities express our strong support for H.R. 765, the “Water Infrastructure Resiliency and Sustainability Act of 2013.” This important legislation will help communities prepare their water, wastewater, and stormwater infrastructure for the threats posed by extreme weather and changing hydrological conditions.

It is well documented that the next several decades will strain the resources of the nation’s drinking water, wastewater and stormwater agencies. One recent study estimated that these systems will have to spend as much as \$1 trillion over forty years just to continue current service levels due to the impacts of severe drought, more frequent hurricanes and floods, and rising sea levels. Outgoing EPA Administrator Lisa Jackson has recognized these risks as well, calling adaptation to changing hydrological conditions a “significant issue” facing the nation’s water systems.

The “Water Infrastructure Resiliency and Sustainability Act of 2013” will offer competitive matching funds to help the nation’s water, wastewater, and stormwater agencies undertake projects to adapt their infrastructure to extreme weather events and changing hydrological conditions. Eligible projects will include efforts to conserve water or increase efficiency in its use, preserve or improve water quality, rebuild or relocate threatened infrastructure, protect source waters and ecosystems, and implement advanced treatment technologies such as water reuse and recycling.

The legislation encourages water systems to utilize innovative infrastructure approaches that will serve as models for other communities struggling with similar water management challenges. Local water utilities will also be able to use funding assistance to increase their use of renewable energy or to conduct local-level analyses of future

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water resource challenges they will face. In sum, the legislation will encourage communities across the country to build resiliency into their infrastructure today, and will help ensure uninterrupted water and wastewater service for decades to come.

Again, we strongly support H.R. 765, the “Water Infrastructure Resiliency and Sustainability Act of 2013.” We thank you for your leadership on this issue, and look forward to working with you toward the passage of this important legislation.
